


Windows 10 lock screen slideshow not working

The lock screen is informative, quite a veneer for the Windows 10 login screen that doesn't serve much of the purpose. It only takes a swipe or click and drag to fire it, but if you prefer to disable the lock screen on Windows 10, there are several ways you can do it. If you're working in the latest April update of the Windows 10 Home Edition, then the best way to turn off the lock screen in Windows 10 is to add a new registry key. There are a few steps, but if you follow them one by one, you'll soon know how to get rid of the Windows lock screen forever. Changing the Windows registry can have dramatic consequences for Windows and shouldn't be done so easily. If you are not sure about the changes made at all, start first or talk to a professional. Open the Windows 10 registry editor by typing Regedit into the Windows search bar. Choose the appropriate result. When asked if the app should be allowed to make changes to your device, select Yes. From the left menu, twice HKEY_LOCAL_MACHINE. Double-click SOFTWARE. Double tap Microsoft. Double-click Right-click Windows. From the menu drop out, select a new one and then select Key. Name it personalization. Select key you just created. Tap the right button in the right window glass and select the new one, then select DWORD (32-bit) Value. Rename New value #1 DWORD you just created as NoLockScreen. Regedit should automatically select the entry name to set up, but if not, click on it and select Rename. Double-click NoLockScreen. In data field value, type 1. To find out if there's a change, click Windows key+L to lock your computer. If you're taken straight to the login screen, rather than the lock screen that usually continues it, congratulations, you've successfully disabled the Windows lock screen! While making changes to the Windows 10 registry will disable the lock screen in Windows 10 Home and Windows 10 Pro, the latter have an alternative method that is a little faster. It also works for corporate and educational versions of Windows 10 too. Search for Gpedit in the Windows 10 search rack and select the appropriate result. In the local group policy editor's window, look at the left menu and double-click the administrative templates. Double-click Control Panel. Select Personalization. Double-click Do not display the lock screen in the right-hand window. Choose Enabled in the top left left, then select Apply and select OK. Test to see if you've successfully disabled the lock screen by pressing the Windows key. If you delivered to the login screen and not to the lock screen, congratulations, you have removed the Windows 10 lock screen from your system. If you ever want to re-enable the lock screen, repeat the steps above and select the disabled during the sixth step instead. October 3, 2016 4 min. Read this story originally appeared on The first item that greets you when you prepare Windows 10 is the lock screen. Clicking or or it leads you to the login screen where you log in to Windows. Yes, the lock screen seems unnecessary, but it brings with it some pieces that can be useful before you even run Windows. From the lock screen, you can view information from certain apps. You can chat with Cortana if you have installed a new update to Windows 10 Anniversary. And you can customize the screen with your favorite background image or slideshow. Here's how it's done. To set up the lock screen in Windows 10, click the Start button and click on the settings icon. (For those of you who have installed the Windows 10 Anniversary update, the Settings icon looks like a small gear.) From the Settings screen, click on the category for personalization and then click on the settings for the lock screen. The first thing we do is select a background image for the Lock screen. Click on the drop-off menu under the background. Let's choose Windows Spotlight. The spotlight option displays another image periodically, only you get a vote on which image you like. Windows will ask whether you like or dislike a particular image to try to find out your preferences and then display the images it thinks will hit your imagination. The second option for The Image allows you to select an image from one of the images the sketch is displayed. Or you can click on the View button to select another image from your own photos or from another folder. And the third option for Slideshow allows you to select multiple images that are segway from one to the other to play a slideshow on the lock screen. The next option allows you to display tips and other information about Windows and Cortana on the lock screen. This option is only available if you decide to install a background image as an image. Next, you can select an app to see specific details from it on the lock screen. Click on the select app icon to show the detailed status. You can learn details from weather, messages, calendar, mail and other applications. For example, when you select a calendar, you may see a meeting scheduled for today, and your current temperature may appear when you choose the weather. Then you can also select multiple apps to display quick status, which simply means fewer details. Click on each icon under the phrase Select apps to show quick status. Again, you can choose apps such as weather, messaging and calendar, as well as alarms and watches, mail and Windows Store. The next time the lock screen pops up, you should see information from the apps you have chosen. If you're happy with the lock screen image, you can save the same for the screen. Just turn on the following option: Show a background image of the lock screen on the wa-a-a-a screen. Finally, the coolest option of all can be the ability to communicate with Cortana on the lock screen without having to log in. Just click on a link that says: Cortana locks screen settings. A Cortana settings bar appears that displays an option that reads, Use Cortana even when my device is locked. Make sure the setting is on and be able to tell Hey Cortana, and place the question or command of Microsoft's voice assistant right from the lock screen. This option is only available if you have installed a Windows 10 Anniversary update. Scroll down a little further and you can also turn on the let Cortana option to manage my calendar, email, messages and Power BI data when my device is locked. So with some simple settings and customization changes, there's a lot you can do in Windows 10 with a lock screen, not even to log in. Savers are an interesting tool in the modern computer age. As the name suggests, they were originally designed to protect CRT screens from permanent combustion. These days the almost universal screen technology to use is THE LCD. While LCD can suffer from constant image burn, it really only happens with commercial screens in places like airports where the image has static elements for hundreds and hundreds of hours. As a desktop computing problem, it just doesn't matter anymore. However, savers still have their application. They can be used as a security measure if you forget to lock your computer while walking away from it. It is also an attractive decoration when the computer is not in use. Each iteration of Windows has quite a decent selection of screensavers, but Windows 10 seems to step back in one particular direction. In Windows 7, the built-in slideshow screensaver had a relative wealth of options. You could have interesting transitions, images appear in random places on the screen and generally spice things up when displaying your photo collection. In Windows 10, you're centered on the image and there are no transitions at all. So while Windows 10 Live Wallpapers is pretty cool, those of us who want to showcase their own collection of images aren't too happy. So we went on the hunt for some alternatives that could bring back the charm of the old screensaver and boy we found some good ones! gPhotoShow (Free and Pro version 10.90 Euros) gPhotoShow manages to be quite a lot of features, while at the same time pretty streamlined and easy to use. You can add a few folders as picture sources, but unfortunately you can't show multiple images on the screen at the same time. The first big advantage gPhotoShow has over photo screensavers is the casual placement of small photos. Windows Photos only supports a centered view that can make a small image look blunt on large, wide monitors. The pro version of gPhotoShow offers quite a few extra features, but none that the average user absolutely should have. The free edition is pretty much what you want from a decent slideshow screensaver. Some features that can cost the asking price include panoramic animation, TIFF support, panoramic photo support, video clip support, and the ability to memorize the latest image in a sequence between plays. For our money, the scrapbook mode, which combines multiple images to fill the screen, is the most worthwhile reason to buy a pro version. However, the next screensaver offers almost identical feature for free. Endless Slideshow (Free and Pro Version \$19.95) The endless slideshow's main claim to fame is the fact that it can automatically upload photos within a few sets of predetermined themes. The upside of this is that you may be surprised by photos that you have never seen before. It's also great if you're not the kind of person who likes to curate your own photo collection. Endless slideshows are incredibly many features and you can customize it pretty much to your exact needs. Multiple on-screen images, a custom background, a variety of size options and well-marked features make it doddle into use. Unfortunately, the installation of the program also include images it automatically loads itself also a bit of a gamble. First, you can see images that you really don't like. At worst, there are always concerns that some inappropriate photos may sneak in by accident. This has never been the case during testing, but frankly, the infinite part of the value offer is actually the least interesting part of the package. As a clean saver slideshow, The Infinite Slideshow is brilliant, but there are some annoying limitations in the free version. Having fewer conversions and limiting the number of images on the screen to 4 per screen is not a huge deal. However, the ability to manually advance a slideshow is a feature that should always be there. Unfortunately, the free version of Endless Slideshow doesn't allow you to do that. This can be a dealbreaker for some, since the default photos screensaver does allow for this. However, Infinite is better overall and you can create some really interesting custom looks with it. If you stump up twenty bucks for a pro version you get a manual image viewing feature as well as more. One Pro license also allows you to install software on two computers, so if you have two machines it works up to ten bucks apiece. This is a great slideshow screensaver, and everyone should try the free version, at least. ScreenPaver (\$14.95) Unfortunately, ScreenPaver doesn't have a free version and you'll have to pay the asking price if you want to use it. The good news is that there's a 30-day trial, with no feature restrictions other than an annoying reminder of how many days you have left. For your money you will get a solid, full featured slideshow screensaver with the features you expect. You can randomize the position of the images, stretch them, scale them and generally tell the software how you want the images to be processed. This seems like a basic requirement for a screensaver like this, but the one included with Windows 10 does none of this except randomization Speaking of image selection, ScreenPaver has a pretty robust system to choose which catalogs you draw your photos from. You can pull them out of multiple drives, select subfolders, and even tag certain photos in your folder as favorites. It doesn't have as many transitions as some other saver, but it is doubtful that many people will be concerned with only a few dozen transition effects, not hundreds of them. Worth \$15? It's a solid buy, especially if you don't quite get what you want with the two free options above.
